



THE WYCKOFF FARM HOUSE

N. C. Wyckoff, Prop'r

In the town of Gilboa there is no prettier or more convenient country residence than that along being to N. C. Wyckoff, near this village, the above of which is an accurate picture, looking down from the South-west.

It is pleasantly and conveniently situated on a gradual slope of the Western Catskills, 2,000 feet above tide-water and is spoken of by guests as "a harbor of country comfort and accommodation." It is bounded in front by a neat, well-kept yard of shade-trees and flowers, while fruit trees luxuriantly abound on either side and rear.

From the porch, one has an extended view of both Catskill and Helderberg ranges. To the left, within a few minutes' walk up a gradual ascent of 400 feet, is Stevens' Mountain, 8,000 feet above tide-water. Nearly in front is a celebrated Utsyantho Mt. Adjacent to the house is some of the most majestic scenery in the world; the Manorkill Falls and Ravine; the Minekill Falls and Ravine, and the Gilboa Falls, all forming picturesque and grand surroundings surpassed by no location in the Catskill range, and giving to guests new and varied scenes and recreation with each day.

The house was built and furnished in 1886; built according to designs and specifications drawn by A. Jenkins of Roxbury, N.Y., one of the most concise architects in this section of the state.

Among the guests now registered at "the Wyckoff House" are Mr. and Mrs. William Irwin, Johnny and William Irwin of New York City; Mr. and Mrs. S. T. Maddox and family of Brooklyn, L.I., and Mr. Diestelhorst and daughter of Brooklyn, L.I. Those there at present are spending this season in enjoyment, and others are expected.
